What are team matches? The Nationals offer a total for four rifle matches; three in service rifle and one in the games.

How do members get a spot on a team? 1. Shoot a CMP legal service rifle. 2. Say you will go.

Hearst Doubles Team Match - this team competition consists of two shooters.

- Each shooter fires 10 shots from the standing position at 200 yards. This is pair firing (both shooters use the same target; shooter on the right shoots then shooter on the left shoots.)
- Each shooter then shoots rapid sitting at 200 yards. This begins with the shooter in a standing position, when the target pops up the shooter sits down, shoots two shots, reloads and shoots

eight more. You have 60 seconds to do this. The team member not shooting may coach the shooter (position to watch the hits and make sight adjustments.) When this is complete change positions and repeat.

- The teams move back to 300 yards for rapid prone. At this point the shooter makes an elevation change and may make a wind call change. This again begins with the shooter in a standing position, when the targets pop up drop into the prone position, shoot two shots, reload and shoot eight more. Again, the other team may coach during this time. You have 70 seconds to complete this. When the time is up change place and the shooter is now the coach.
- The teams now moves to 600 yards for slow prone. At this point another elevation change will be necessary. The wind can make a huge difference. It's necessary to put your heads together on this one to dial in windage. This is a



are on the board the bullets shot straight at them go into the impact area or berm. However we do have the pistol pits and Multi-Purpose range where target stands can be move by the shooter. When using these stands please remember the bullets will go straight through the target and hit what is behind it. Specifically we have had the wall in BAY 1 of the Multi-Purpose range shot up twice. I'd like to think this was due to some poor target placement where rounds were shot at an angle and hit the wall and they weren't purposely shooting at the wall. Please always be aware of where your bullet is going to end up and it should be into the dirt berm not trees or walls.

As the temperatures warm up we're all looking forward to soothing our cabin fever with a little gun smoke on the range.

I hope to see you there.

true team effort. Each shooter fires 10 shots pair firing on the same target. Again, coaching and communication is a must during this phase of the competition.







This is a fun competition and it's a short day (usually finished by one o'clock.) It's a great opportunity for new competitors to pair up with someone with a little more experience. If you don't have a partner you can be squadded with another solo shooter. I did this my first two years at the Nationals and it was a lot of fun and I met a lot of nice people. This year MRPC had a number of teams.

NATIONAL TEAM TROPHY MATCH



This match is hotly contested between the Army and the Marines.

Each team consist of six shooters, two pit pullers and may also have a captain and a coach. The pit pullers are in target pits for the entire match; they do not shoot. Each team must have a new shooter each year that has never competed in the team trophy match.

This year MRPC had 10 members wishing to shoot. Two more people were found on-line which brought us to two six man teams. Pit pullers may be hired for this match. We hired three marines and one other for pit duty. Each was paid \$150. Team match fees for a six man team is \$100. This worked out to \$67 per shooter.

Currently the CMP is working toward having electronic targets. Their goal is to have this completed by 2019 which would elevate the need for the pit pullers. This will mean no more pit duties, matches are over soon, no slow target service, and no pit changes. This sounds great, however, there's always two sides to everything. On the ready line or the firing line there is no time to talk to fellow shooters. I have learned a great deal in the pits from many excellent shooters. Where else do you have the opportunity to spend a couple of hours with an Olympian, AMU members (Army Marksmanship Unit), or a Marine Rifle Team member giving tips, advice, or technique. This will not hurt their scores and helping the rest of us be better shots is something they seem to enjoy (as long as we listen more than we talk.)

The National Team Trophy Match is 10 shots standing in 10 minutes for each shooter. It moves next to 10 shots sitting in 60 seconds for each shooter. We then move to 300 yards for 10 shots rapid prone in 70 seconds. It's then on to 600 yards for 20 shots slow prone for each shooter. The total of all six shooter will be the team score.

Coaching is allowed and encouraged. Last year the MRPC team used one of our best shooters for our coach/captain. We had a 15year old competing in his first real match, and we sent an old man to the pits (me.) Did we win? No. That's not actually the point. Teamwork and encouraging new people and helping to learn the ropes is what team play is all about. If you think you're not good enough for the Nationals and you might hurt the team score, fear not. We all have good days and bad days. Do your best and have fun and that's all we can do. The fifteen year old had the time of his life...and...the old man survived.

NATIONAL TROPHY INFANTRY TEAM MATCH (AKA RATTLE BATTLE)



This competition goes back to the days when Army squads used two BARs and four Springfield rifles between six men firing at eight targets with a total of 384 rounds.

Back in the 50s and 60s the DCM had BARs for civilian teams to use; those days are long gone. The AR-15 now rules. The targets are Army E silhouettes {40" tall 19 1/2" wide.)

Correct windage is very important. These teams consist of eight men; six shooters and a non-firing captain and coach.

At 600 yards you start in prone position. The targets pop up for 50 seconds. Shoot fast! All hits on the silhouette count for 4 points and misses are not marked.

Then entire line then marches abreast in a straight line to 500 yards. Take positions fast for another 50 seconds of shooting, 3 points for hits. IF rounds are remaining it is time for rapid sitting. The usual cadence for 200 rapids sitting just isn't going to cut it for this. We all marched to 200 for rapid standing. If you ever tried rapid fire standing in a 50 second window you would understand why it's best to get all shots off at 500 and 600 in this competition.

After the 200 yard shots the entire team goes to the target pits to pull for the next relay and the day is done.

MRPC teams practiced for this match to get zeros for the magazine length rounds. We are very fortunate to have 500 and 600 yards ranges to use for practice. This is the first year that MRPC had teams competing this this competion. We tried two different approaches. Team 1 - plan for this. Hit probabilities at 500 vs. 600; with the different shooters. Who gets how many rounds, shooters covering 2 targets should be the best, fast, and so on. Team 2 - buy some good, hot 77 grain ammo; load the magazines; shoot like hell. Team 1 went to a clinic the Marines put on the night before the match. More information we never thought of. Recalculate as only a bunch of engineers can. Comeup with a revised battle plan.



Show Time, Army and Marine units in uniform, marching with pennents out in front, teams from all over the country or the world. This is worth the trip just to see. How did we do ? Like all good battle plans it went stright to Hell with the first shot fired . The first team got a better score but wait till next year, we learned a lot and will use this in a new plan.

Vintage Sniper Rifle Team Match

This is the only team match in the CMP games, a relative new addition started in 2011 using equipment military snipers had prior to 1952. Scopes and rifles allowed are listed on the CMP website.

The spirit of this match was to revive older rifles that may have been sitting in the safe. CMP game matches are about older firearms, marksmanship and enjoying a little competition. A wide range of rifles and scopes, that fit the criteria, may be used without starting an "arms race". Well that was the intent. Prices for approved older scopes soon jumped, aftermarket replica scopes appeared, (Note; still better to buy an original".)



Two man teams fire from 300 and 600 yards using slings or sandbags but not both. One member is the spotter and the other is the shooter. A sighting in period of 5 minutes for both members goes by much to fast. Tweaking these old, low power scopes with their coarse adjustments make the other member with a good spotting scope a must. 2 1/2 power is the most common with an 8 power Unertl mounted to an 1903 Springfield one of the top picks. After the sighting in period targets go down into the pits. First shooter makes ready. Targets go up for 20 seconds then down for 20 seconds, 10 times for score. When it comes up the spotter calls the location of the hit and adjustments, fire the next shot because it's going down after 20 seconds. 10 shots for record. 2 minutes to change positions, targets up 20 and down 20 for the other man's 10 shot score. Time to move back to the 600 yard line. 5 minute sighting in period and 10 for record from each team member. No alibis, no refires, no challenges and the clock doesn't stop ticking.

Sounds simple, what could possible go wrong? Well if you're going to shoot 30 06 rounds at 600 yards a stout load with heavy bullets fired from 8 pound, steel butt plated Springfield will be needed, right? Heavy recoil can take a toll on old things like optics, rifles and vintage shooters. Rifle V.P. Joe and myself have teamed up each year for this match since 2011. The first year we both used my newly acquired 8X Unertl varmint scope that I hadn't quite figured all the adjustments, like focus, parallax and which way to turn the unmarked knobs. Bang, were did that one hit, 2 O'clock 8 ring. 0 K I'll hold 8 O'clock 8 ring. We did the best we could and tied with Larry and Bill from the club, same score and X count. They were one place higher on the list because their last shot was of higher value than ours. This is call a Creedmoor, Larry and Bill gently reminded us of this for the next 52 weeks. The gauntlet had been thrown down and the contest was on.

Joe and I usually do pretty well in this match, most years we get a medal, silver or bronze with gold as the goal. It seems one or the other of us carries the team each year for one reason or the other. This year was no exception. Joe shoots a Springfield 03A3 with a 2 1/2 X original scope, I still have the 1903 with the Unertl varmint scope. 300-yard sighting in 5 minutes went well. Joe scores 95-0X, I score 99- 2X. Back to 600, adjust for elevation, 5 minutes period starts and neither of us are on paper. Target doesn't go down and no feedback. What? Readjust for elevation and Joe gets on paper and centers on the target. I only got 3 or 4 shots off sighting in due to the target pullers slow response.



Get on paper and may have adjusted for windage in the wrong direction, my last shot was not on the target. Times up, targets down. Joe's scores a very respectable 92-4X. 2 minutes to change shooters, clocks ticking. Joe do we try to get my rifle on target or do I shoot your rifle? Make the call, shoot my rifle. OK swap rifles and for the first time in my life I look through a 2 1/2 power scope with a post, no cross hairs. Joe do you have 10 rounds left? No. Well guess I'll shoot my rounds in your rifle. Targets up, bang, where did that one hit? Finished with a 82-0X. Team took a Bronze. It's always something.



Training is essential for shooting sports. The aim of training is 2-fold for MRPC. We offer basic training to help members become more skilled and safe with their guns and cause members to be aware of the various competitive discipline opportunities at the club. If you are interested in a particular shooting discipline you have several avenues of education available to you to get familiar with your interest(s). 1) Show up before the match starts and volunteer to work. 2) Contact the Match Director listed on the MRPC website and ask questions. 3) Read your Primer Pops, email blasts, and club calendars to see when discipline-specific clinics are to be held.

We also have in the works Handgun 1 and 2 classes, a MRPC range rules seminar, and a basic rifle class for those not wanting to compete but to increase their basic knowledge. These are family friendly, low cost, and all are welcome. Already established are Junior programs in High Power and Small Bore rifle.

Plus, ladies, we want to increase your participation! Look for Handgun 1 and 2 classes via email blast sign-ups. The Wednesday a.m. Steel matches are a perfect, low key entrance to pistol shooting competition. Drop the kids at school and come out to the club on the 2nd Wednesday of the month at 9am and have some fun. Check the club calendar for dates!
